		<ul> <li>"exhort" – parakalĕō – to beseech or to call for</li> <li>"elder" – prĕsbutĕrŏs – speaks of the shepherd or pastor or overseer, while emphasizing spiritual maturity (same word in verse 5)</li> <li>"shepherd" – pŏimainō – supervise</li> </ul>

	0	Peter issues a call with	a and a _	in this passage:
		• The challenge: to live with "humility" – $tap\check{e}in\check{o}phr\check{o}sun\bar{e}$ – humbleness of mind		
		Two important things about this challenge:		
		<ul> <li>We should all desire to give God our burdens; and</li> </ul>		
		<ul> <li>He wants us to do just that because he cares deeply for us.</li> </ul>		
		• The caution: we have a dangerous opponent in our battle called life. The devil's for us is to "devour" – <i>katapinō</i> – us (to gulp, to drown, to swallow up).

	0	<ul> <li>"restore" – <i>katartizō</i> – to make perfect</li> <li>"establish" – <i>stērizō</i> – to fix or to steadfastly set</li> <li>"strengthen" – <i>sthĕnŏō</i> – to confirm in spiritual knowledge and power</li> <li>"support" – <i>thĕmĕliŏō</i> – to ground or to settle</li> <li>Verse 11 explains how God can fulfill these promises and why we can trust Him:</li> <li>— – ultimate power; all strength; dominance</li> <li>— – in perpetuity; endlessly; always</li> </ul>		
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
